

JARE Editors' Report

June 1, 2011–May 31, 2012

The *JARE* editorial team of Gary Brester, Myles Watts, Vince Smith, and Joe Atwood (MSU) began their three-year term with manuscript 2009–0535, submitted April 1, 2009.

From April 2009 to December 2012, the Montana *JARE* editorial team managed over 600 manuscript submissions and will have published 9 journal issues through the end of 2012. As of April 2012, the management of new submissions was passed to the Idaho/Washington team of Chris McIntosh, Hayley Chouinard, Greg Galinato, and Larry Makus, who will publish their first issue in April 2013.

The last manuscript submitted in March 2012 was numbered 2012–1232.

Publication details for the three issues published during the past year are reported in table 1.

JARE Manuscript Management: Submission details from June 1, 2011–May 31, 2012, are reported in table 2. A total of 219 manuscripts were submitted during the year; of these, 24 manuscripts were resubmissions, resulting in 195 unique manuscripts (ignoring multiple submissions of the same manuscript). Of these, 2 papers are currently under review and 217 have been completed (i.e., a publication decision has been made). The journal's acceptance rate is 14.7% of all completed submissions, and 16.6% of completed unique submissions.

JARE Publication Costs: JARE publication costs are incurred in three general areas: Editorial Team, Technical Editing, and Printing. The Editorial Team manages the review and publication process. The team's costs are fixed on an annual basis. Assuming that each volume (a total of three issues) contains 500 printed pages, these costs total \$40/page. Technical Editing involves formatting final documents into pdfs that are used by Sheridan Press during the printing process. This process involves formatting text and figures, checking references, resolving technical errors, and formatting figures and tables to maintain consistency and fit within available space. These costs are approximately \$25/page. Finally, Sheridan Press prints, binds, and mails print versions of the *Journal* to members and other subscribers. Some of these costs are fixed and some are variable. Total costs for the most recent issue were approximately \$31/page. In summary, JARE's costs per printed page are approximately \$96/page. These costs are met through a combination of page charges (\$79-89/page), member dues, subscriptions, royalties, and WAEA assets.

Publication details for the three volumes published during the past three years are reported in table 3.

Submission details from the Montana State University team's tenure (April 1, 2009–March 31, 2012) are reported in table 4. A total of 637 manuscripts were submitted during this time; of these, 144 manuscripts were resubmissions, resulting in 493 unique manuscripts (ignoring multiple submissions of the same manuscript). The journal's acceptance rate is 14.0% of all completed submissions, and 18.1% of completed unique submissions.

Distinguished Scholars

B. Wade Brorsen (Oklahoma State University), Distinguished Scholar

Wade Brorsen is Regents Professor and A.J. and Susan Jacques Chair at Oklahoma State University. He earned B.S. and M.S. degrees in agricultural economics from OSU, an M.S. in statistics from University of Wisconsin, and a Ph.D. in agricultural economics from Texas A&M University. He joined OSU in 1991 after eight years at Purdue University. He served as editor of *Journal of Agricultural and Resource Economics* and *American Journal of Agricultural Economics*. Wade has delivered the WAEA Keynote Address, received the WAEA outstanding published research award, and has published fifteen articles in WAEA journals. He has published over 180 refereed journal articles. He served as chair of the NCCC-134 Committee on Applied Commodity Price Analysis, Forecasting, and Market Risk Management and has been an active member. Wade has been recognized by both Oklahoma State University and the American Agricultural Economics Association with outstanding graduate teaching awards.



Susan Capalbo (Oregon State University), Distinguished Scholar



Susan Capalbo is currently department head for the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics at Oregon State University. She has been involved in the economics of climate change, carbon sequestration, and integrated policy analysis and tradeoff assessment for the past 20 years. She is currently the co-PI on a USDA NIFA grant addressing adaptation of agricultural production to climate change, a student-centered National Needs Fellowship grant and other projects funded by NSF, NOAA, USDA and DOE. While at Montana State University, she was the director of the Big Sky Carbon Sequestration Partnership, addressing the economics of carbon sequestration. She has developed a research program promoting women in STEM, and was awarded several diversity and research collaborative grants including an NSF ADVANCE Leadership Award, and the Marie Tharp Fellowship at the Earth Institute at Columbia University. Dr. Capalbo received her Ph.D. in agricultural economics from the University of California-Davis and her B.S./M.S. at the University of Rhode Island. Past appointments have been at MSU, Resources for the Future, UC-Davis, and University of Maryland. She has co-edited two books and written numerous journal articles and papers related to her research and diversity efforts.

Gordon C. Rausser (University of California, Berkeley), Distinguished Scholar

Gordon Rausser is currently Robert Gordon Sproul Distinguished Professor, University of California, Berkeley, where he has taught in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics (ARE) for thirty years. He has also served as dean of the College of Natural Resources (1994–2000), chair of ARE (three terms), and chair of the Giannini Foundation of Agricultural Economics. While on leave from Berkeley, Gordon was senior economist at the President's Council of Economic Advisors and later chief economist at the Agency for International Development in Washington, D.C. Gordon has published hundreds of articles and several books, including, most recently, *Political Power and Economic Policy* (Cambridge, 2011). He has won 17 national awards and honors for teaching and research and currently serves as editor of the *Annual Review of Resource Economics*. Dr. Rausser frequently comments on public-policy issues on national radio and television and advises business and political leaders.
